In early-May the Carolinas Section of the PGA issued the announcement "Back2Golf in the Carolinas" and implementation of Phase One of a three-phase approach with restrictions and guidelines applicable to golf operations in North and South Carolina. The principal change was lifting the single rider per cart restriction, and clubs were allowed to institute their own policies as CCGC has done and with which most are now familiar, i.e. approved pairings and family

members may ride together. Phase Two was announced by the Carolinas PGA in late-May. Many of the Phase One restrictions remain in force such as avoiding touch of flagsticks and bunker rakes as well as no on-course amenities, e.g., water coolers. However, as applicable to South Carolina clubs only and based on the Governor McMaster's "lifting of restrictions on attractions," group activity (outings and league play) may be resumed if kept under 50 people with proper social distancing. Mike D. will inform CCGC groups as to how this policy will be implemented. The ultimate objective of Phase Three – the "New Normal" – is basically golf as it was before the outbreak of COVID-19. Regrettably it may be a long time in coming.
